The Native American Leadership in Education (NALE) Program is for high-potential paraprofessional Native Americans who plan to complete their degrees and obtain credentials as teachers, counselors, or administrators. Both programs operate nationwide. Awards may be grants, loans, or a combination of both; may be in any field the Board of Directors finds beneficial to Native American peoples; and are merit-based rather than need-based awards.

Eligibility Requirements: Applicants must be one-fourth degree American Indian and an enrolled member of a federally recognized, state recognized, or terminated U.S. tribe. They must attend an accredited two-year or four-year college or university on a full-time basis; 3.0 GPA or higher; must have a high ACT and/or a high SAT score; and must apply to all other sources of funding for which they are eligible. Applicants may be entering freshman, undergraduate or graduate students, or Ph.D. candidates.

Every two years, the Decade Plan is reviewed and revised, project requests are solicited from the public and from City departments, and a capital budget is prepared for submittal to City Council. There are two main programs in the CIP: General Obligation (GO) bond projects and Urban Enhancement Trust Funds (UETF). The Decade Plan specifies the uses of these funds, which are targeted at neighborhood-level initiatives. The UETF supports Capital Projects, which include beautification and landscaping, and Cultural Services Projects, which include cultural, educational, and arts projects. GO bond funds are available for capital project proposals recommended by the Community Planning Partnerships.

Eligibility Requirements: Neighborhood organizations or Community Planning Partnerships may apply for G.O. bond funds. Nonprofit organizations, individuals, neighborhood associations and other community organizations may apply to the UETF.
