Local contributions are made by IBM External Program Managers at locations throughout the U.S. In New Mexico, the local funding focuses on K-12 educational initiatives, or is initiated by employees, retirees, or spouses active in local organizations. Unsolicited proposals are accepted, but priority is given to the two categories above.

Eligibility Requirements: Organizations must be tax-exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Projects or organizations must fall within one of the major initiative areas. IBM volunteer involvement is regarded as an integral element in the review process, and other types of IBM support the organization may already be receiving is taken into account. No grants are made to individuals; political, labor, religious, or fraternal organizations; sports groups; for raffles, auctions, telethons, benefit sporting events, symposia, or conferences. Operating fund requests from United Way member agencies are not considered, nor is support for capital campaigns, construction and renovation projects, chairs, endowments, and scholarships sponsored by individual academic institutions.
