Purpose and Activities: The Contributions program strives to support nonprofit organizations that help the Middle Rio Grande community grow and prosper. Application Data: Organizations must submit a written proposal including description of project; timing of funding; amount needed; impact the project will have on the central New Mexico community; and copy of (501)(c)(3) determination from the IRS. This goal is achieved by building permanent endowment funds whose income supports community needs. The foundation seeks to fund initiatives which are collaborative, inclusive, respond to major gaps in service, and are rooted in the community. Grantmaking is focused in the general fields of arts, civic affairs, education, environment, and health and human services; with specific interest in programs or activities that respond to current and emerging needs; foster harmony, leadership and intercultural understanding; meet health and human service needs; provide reform and innovation in education and learning; encourage access to the performing arts and visual arts; or preserve the natural environment and foster a conservation ethic. In addition to unrestricted funds the foundation administers several funds which may be restricted or designated by donors. The foundation also confers an annual Piñon Award to five nonprofit organizations that have made outstanding contributions to the community. The award carries a \$1,000 unrestricted grant.

Eligibility Requirements: Proposals are invited from non-profit, tax-exempt organizations in Santa Fe and northern New Mexico, including Santa Fe, Los Alamos, Rio Arriba, Taos, San Miguel, and Mora counties. Grants are not made to individuals; for religious purposes; for political purposes; to governmental agencies experiencing operational budget cuts; for capital outlay or capital campaigns; or for endowment funds. Technical Assistance grants will not be awarded for travel, conferences, creation of new organizations, equipment, staff salaries, or events.

Purpose and Activities: The mission of the Santa Fe Institute (SFI) is to conduct and foster scientific research having four dominant, general properties: 1) transdisciplinary-topics of interest transcend any single scientific discipline and cannot be studied adequately in traditional disciplinary contexts, so SFI researchers knit together a variety of scientific approaches enabled by a growing set of tools and seek to assemble and provide adequate resources for a broad scientific and scholarly community seeking common language and principles; 2) excellent-SFI applies rigorous standards of excellence to its program, which means it will not undertake new research unless it can attract outstanding, creative and dedicated people, can set new directions for science, and can tackle problems where success will make a major contribution; 3) fresh-because of its limited resources and its desire to remain small enough to permit broad collaboration among those in residence, SFI will not duplicate research pursued by other institutions; and 4) catalytic-SFI will demonstrate and communicate its views, methods, and successes broadly, and will encourage many people from other institutions to experience the SFI atmosphere as visiting researchers. In support of these goals, SFI offers Postdoctoral Fellowships in Complex Systems Studies. It is also occasionally possible for a graduate student to arrange to conduct research at SFI under the tutelage of a scientist in residence. Typically this is thesis research, conducted after all course work required by the home institution has been completed. SFI also conducts the Complex Systems Summer School. Alumni of this program are eligible for the Steinmetz Fellow Award, which supports a one-month research residency at the institute.

Eligibility Requirements: Postdoctoral Fellowship candidates should have a Ph.D. or expect to receive one before September of the year in which they are applying, in the mathematical, computational, physical, biological or social sciences, with an academic record of scientific excellence, a demonstrated ability for independent research, and a strong

interest in interdisciplinary approaches. Incomplete applications will not be considered.

Application Data: Postdoctoral Fellowship applicants should submit a curriculum vitae, list of publications, and statement of research interests, and arrange for three letters of recommendation to be sent. Purpose and Activities: The School of American Research (SAR) is a center for advanced studies in anthropology and related disciplines and the support of Native American art and artists. It is dedicated to fostering and publishing original research that contributes to a better understanding of human culture, evolution, and behavior. The SAR pursues its goals through six programs: resident scholar fellowships, advanced seminars, the J. I. Staley Prize for outstanding books in anthropology, research on Southwest Indian art, book publishing, and interpretation of scholarly research to the general public. The Resident Scholar Fellowship Program awards six fellowships to scholars working in anthropology or from anthropologi-

cally informed perspectives in such fields as history, sociology, art, law, and philosophy.

There are three fellowship categories. The Weatherhead Fellowship supports two pre- or postdoctoral scholars whose work may be humanistic or scientific. The National Endowment for the Humanities Fellowship supports three postdoctoral scholars in the humanities, broadly defined. The Karin H. Lamon Fellowship supports a Native American scholar, either pre- or postdoctoral, whose research meets the same criteria as those of other resident scholar categories.

The SAR supports three advanced seminars per year. Each is a meeting of ten scholars in anthropology and related disciplines for five days of intense debate and discussion, with the aim of promoting communication among scholars who are at a critical stage of related research. SAR prefers to support seminars that promise significant results for the field as a whole, rather than narrow topics, or those with a tight geographic focus. The J. I. Staley Prize is awarded to a living author for a book that stands as an example of the best work being done in anthropology today; to acknowledge those innovative works that have gone beyond traditional frontiers in anthropology.

Eligibility Requirements: Preference for resident scholars is given to those applicants whose field work, basic research and analysis is complete and who need time to write manuscripts. Fellowships are in-residence for outstanding scholarship in the field of anthropology. To be considered for the J. I. Staley Prize, a book must have been published at least two years, but not more than ten years, before the nomination. Once a book is nominated, it remains in the pool of nominees until it passes the ten-year limit or goes out of print. Coauthored books may be nominated, but edited volumes may not. Authors and publishers may not nominate their own books.

Application Data: Application material is available from the school. Fellowship applications require six copies of each of the following: cover sheet (downloadable) on top; an abstract, not to exceed 150 words, describing the purpose, goals, and objectives of the project; a proposal, no more than 4 pages in length. The proposal should describe what is to be accomplished during the fellowship year; the status of the applicant's research on the topic and the significance of the work; a short bibliography, not to exceed 1 page, of references cited in proposal; and a curriculum vitae, not to exceed 4 pages. For all applicants, three letters of recommendation are required and must be received by November 15. Applicants are responsible for confirming with recommenders that letters are sent on time. For Lamon applicants, a brief statement of

tribal affiliation is required. For NEH applicants, six copies of a separate statement, not to exceed one page, explaining how the project is related to the humanities is required. For pre-doctoral applicants, a brief letter of nomination from the applicant's degree-granting department, written by the department chair and sent directly to the school is required. Nominees must have completed all requirements except for the dissertation by November 15 of the year of application. Proposals and abstracts must be double-spaced, using at least 12-point type, and with at least 1-inch margins on all sides. Email and faxed applications will not be accepted.

Any scholar wishing to organize an advanced seminar should send five copies of a proposal no more than six pages long, typed double-spaced, to the school at the address given below. They encourage seminar organizers to include scholars representing a mix of perspectives, disciplines, or subdisciplines and to consider the ethnic and gender balance of the group. The proposal should explain the topic of the seminar and key questions to be addressed; how the topic is of broad importance to anthropology; why a seminar is necessary in order to address the topic; why a seminar is needed now; who the participants in the seminar might be, why each has been included and what each would be asked to write about; and the expected results of the seminar.

Each copy of the application must include: 1) a one-page bibliography of references cited in the proposal; and 2) the applicant's curriculum vitae, not to exceed 4 pages. A seminar addressing a critical contemporary issue should also include a plan for disseminating the results to a broader audience.

To nominate a book for the J. I. Staley Prize, submit a letter of nomination or use the nomination form, which can be downloaded from the website above. Each nomination should address how the book fulfills the selection criteria, which includes: innovative and rigorous thinking in terms of theory, research methods, and/or application of findings; superior integration of sub-disciplinary and/or interdisciplinary perspectives; significant contribution to our understanding of humankind; and demonstrated or anticipated impact on the field of anthropology. Each nomination must be for a single outstanding and influential book.

Deadline: Fellowship applications are due by November 15. Seminar proposal deadline is April 1. Seminars are scheduled eighteen months in advance of when they are held. Book nominations are accepted at any time, but books nominated after October 1 will be considered for the next year's prize.

Fiscal Information: Fellowships provide an apartment and an office on the school's campus, small stipends, a small reference library and library assistance, and other benefits during a nine-month tenure-September 1 through May 31. For seminars, SAR provides facilities, lodging, meals, and round-trip coach airfare within the United States. The J. I. Staley Prize is \$10,000.

Priority is given to projects and programs that make our communities better places to live, learn, and work; that are measurable with stated goals and objectives; that clearly demonstrate effectiveness and innovation; that are models for others; that can eventually be self-supporting or show other evidence of long-term viability. Contributions for capital needs, including renovations, equipment, and construction, are not encouraged. Specific projects and programs are preferred over general operating funds. Multi-year contributions and the purchase of tables at fund-raising events are discouraged. Organizations that receive United Way or Fine Arts or other general campaign funds, already supported by the foundation, do not receive priority for funding. The foundation does not make contributions to religious organizations (unless they are engaged in a significant program benefiting the entire community); to political causes or candidates; to anti-business organizations; for courtesy advertising; to organizations that discriminate on the basis of race, creed, religion, gender, or national origin; to private foundations; or to veterans, fraternal, or labor groups.

Application Data: For grants, written requests are required. Provide a brief description of the organization, a brief description of the program for which support is requested, including rationale, a detailed project budget, schedule of implementation, methods of evaluating and reporting results, and qualifications of program manager. Purpose and Activities: The purpose of the Soroptimist Foundation is to initiate and support programs that will directly answer current needs in education, science, or the

literary world, serving the public welfare. Among other programs, the foundation sponsors the Women's Opportunity Awards Program that aids mature women who, as heads of households, must enter or return to the job market or further skills and training in order to upgrade their employment status. Local Soroptimist clubs participate in the Women's Opportunity Awards Program by seeking, screening, and recommending candidates for the awards. Judges at each level are drawn from public life outside the Soroptimist organization.

Eligibility Requirements: Female heads of household who need additional skills, training, and education to upgrade their employment status are eligible for the Women's Opportunity Awards Program. Only women working toward a vocational or undergraduate degree are eligible. The award is not given to women working toward a graduate degree. Soroptimists and their families are not eligible. Recipients are chosen on the basis of financial need and the statement of clear career goals.

Application Data: Applicants can obtain official applications for various programs from a local or regional Soroptimist club, or from the national headquarters. Applications for the Women's Opportunity Awards Program are downloadable from the above website. Application requests must be addressed attention Women's Opportunity Awards Program. It is also responsible for state and federally funded housing programs. It operates a number of loan and grant programs. The "Build It" Loan Guaranty Program guarantees up to 50% of a loan made to qualified developers who are nonprofits or public/tribal agencies. The Emergency Shelter Grants Program provides assistance to units of local government or nonprofit organizations to help meet the costs of operating emergency shelters. The "HELP" Program provides down payment and closing cost assistance to individuals below 80% of area income who are obtaining financing under MFA's MortgageSaver Program. The Helping Hand Program provides down payment and closing cost assistance to low income families with at least one disabled family member. The HOME Program makes funds available to units of local government, nonprofit organizations, public housing authorities, Community Housing Development Organizations, and private organizations for new construction or acquisition and rehabilitation of homeowner properties through a competitive application. The Housing Trust Fund provides flexible assistance to low income New Mexicans, nonprofits, local housing agencies, and tribal government agencies attempting to provide affordable housing in their communities. The Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) provides low-income households with a one-time cash benefit to help pay their utility bills. The MortgageSaver Program provides below market interest rate financing to low and moderate income first-time homebuyers who qualify. The "Partners" Program is designed to assist nonprofit housing organizations which provide housing to families whose income is 50% or less of median area income. The State Homeless Assistance Program provides assistance to units of local government or nonprofit organizations providing emergency shelter or short-term services to homeless individuals and families. The NMMFA also issues Requests for Proposals (RFP) from time to time for housing-related programs or services.
